In 1998, Congress amended the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 to require Federal agencies to make their electronic and information technology (EIT) accessible to people with disabilities.

The law (29 U.S.C § 794 (d)) applies to all Federal agencies when they develop, procure, maintain, or use electronic and information technology.

What is 508 compliance?

Under Section 508, agencies must give disabled employees and members of the public access to information comparable to the access available to others.

What is Assistive Technology?

Assistive Technology (AT) is any item, piece of equipment, or system that is commonly used to increase, maintain, or improve functional capabilities of individuals with disabilities.

Some AT devices are well-known:

- Eyeglasses
- Hearing aids
- Canes
- Wheelchairs

AT software includes the following:

- Text-to-speech converters
- Screen magnifiers
- On-screen keyboards
- Speech-to-text converters

AT relies on proper use of the delivery format.

- Photos
- Website
- Documents
- Forms
- Videos



Social Media Accessibility Tips

- Don't overuse caps
- Use camel case for multi-word hashtags
- Put hashtags and mentions at the end
- Limit emoji use

Tips for Writing Alt-Text

Keep it concise and accurate.

Convey the content: There's a huge gap between "Image of a chart," and something like, "A bar chart illustrates that there has been a year-over-year increase in forest fires, peaking at 100 this year."

Skip saying "image of" or "photograph of."

Transcribe text. If the image has copy that is central to its meaning, make sure you include it in the description.

Use proper grammar.

Need not be redundant (should not be the same as adjacent body of text).

Writing Alt-Text for Maps

Start with macro description, then offer expanded description.

Appropriate to write 'a map of..'

Depending on where you are writing it the alt text may have a character limit. Provide additional information in caption, body of adjacent text, or text of social media post.



Creating Accessible Documents

- HTML and PDF are preferred, but starting with accessible word documents makes it easier
- Use built in formatting tools

- The subject(s) in detail
- The setting
- The actions or interactions
- Other relevant information

(1-2 detailed sentences recommended)

Creating Accessible Documents

- Add alt-text for images: right click, select edit alt-text
- Use tables wisely

Run an Accessibility Check



Convert to PDF

Windows	Go to File > "Save As" and select PDF from the choices provided. By default this produces a PDF that preserves the document's accessibility features. When saving, select <i>Options</i> and be sure that "Document structure tags for accessibility" is checked. This is checked by default, but could become unchecked under certain circumstances.
Mac	Go to File > "Save As" and select PDF from the choices provided. By default this produces a PDF that preserves the document's accessibility features. When saving, be sure the radio button labeled "Best for electronic distribution and accessibility" is selected.



Videos

Closed captioning that is accurate and synchronus:

 The audio parts of your video appear as text at the appropriate time and give access to people who are hearing impaired or deaf.

Provide audio descriptions or adequate narration:

• A description of a video's visual elements, gives access to people who are blind or visually impaired.

Edit video

How to Provide Audio Description

Build	Build the descriptions into the video—The easiest way. Speakers identify themselves and their surroundings, describe what is happening in video.
Make	Make another video—one with audio descriptions and one without.
Add	Add an extra audio track—your video can have more than one audio track attached to it, and the user can choose which one to play.

Build it into the video



Verbally cover all displayed visual information Identify the speaker and speaker changes

Images must have alt-text: be clear, concise, and accurate.



Utilize tools such as formatting, accessibility checker, autocaptioning.



Bake it in, don't bolt it on! When creating content, start making it accessible from the beginning.
