The week-long Incident Management Section Chiefs Academy event is designed to train and develop all-hazard competencies and behaviors for the eight Incident Command System (ICS) command and general staff positions. These positions support the management of an ongoing incident that is greater in complexity than the routine operational response

Individual courses are designed to focus on developing participant's ability to assume responsibility of a specific position, lead position-specific support staff, and communicate effectively. The courses are designed to ensure the participant's completion of assigned training tasks meet the identified objectives for their positions.

ICS-400

ICS for Command & General Staff & Complex Incidents

Mon, January 29, 0800 - Wed, January 31, 1200

Provides advanced application of the Incident Command System (ICS), expanding on the information covered in prerequisite ICS courses (see page 3) by explaining how major incidents engender special management challenges, and describing the circumstances to establish an Area Command. Involving Multiagency Coordination Systems.

EL0950

NIMS ICS All-Hazards Incident Commander

Mon, January 29, 0800 to Fri, February 2, 1700

Provides a robust understanding of the duties, responsibilities, and capabilities of an effective Incident Commander (IC) on an All-Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT) for local- and state-level emergency responders, including:

- 1) Response to incident and command needs of the incident, and
- Effectively fulfilling position responsibilities of an IC on an All-Hazards ICS IMT.

EL0952

NIMS ICS All-Hazards Public Information Officer

Mon, January 29, 0800 to Fri, Feb 2, 1700

The course is designed for a Public Information Officer (PIO) assigned to an incident as a member of an All-Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT) and IMTs or assigned as an Assistant PIO. Participants develop a strong set of core PIO skills and the ability to apply them within the context of an AHIMT.

The course is also distinct from other information function courses by combining elements from both the basic and advanced functions to concentrate training on the fundamental duties and responsibilities of the PIO in an all-hazards environment. The course material does not assume or require experience as a PIO, but also is not a basic PIO course.

NIMS ICS All-Hazards Liaison Officer

Provides local- and state-level emergency responders with a robust understanding of the duties, responsibilities, and capabilities of an effective Liaison Officer on an All-Hazards Incident

Prepare the participant for the duties, responsibilities, and capabilities of an effective Liaison Officer on an All-Hazards Incident Management Team.

NIMS ICS All-Hazards **Logistics Section Chief**

Mon, Jan 29, 0800 to Fri, Feb 2, 1700

provides local- and state-level emergency responders with a robust understanding of the duties, responsibilities, and capabilities of an effective Logistics Section Chief on an All-Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT).

These responsibilities include responding to the incident and effectively fulfilling the position responsibilities of a Logistics Section Chief on an AHIMT. Exercises, simulations, discussions, and a final exam enable participants to process and apply their new knowledge.

EL0973

NIMS ICS All-Hazards Finance/Administration Section Chief

Tues, Jan 30, 1300, to Thurs, Feb 1, 1700

provides local- and state-level emergency responders with a robust understanding of the duties, responsibilities, and capabilities of an effective Finance/Administration Section Chief on an All-Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT).

These responsibilities include managing the Finance/ Administration Section personnel and managing the finances and administrative responsibilities during an incident. Exercises, simulations, discussions, and a final exam enable participants to process and apply their new knowledge.

S-404/EL0954 Blended Safety Officer

Mon, Jan 29, 0900 to Fri, Feb 2, 1700

The course is designed to meet the training needs of the safety officer position in the incident command system. Topics include safety officer effectiveness, analysis techniques, safety messages, briefings and reports, and high hazard operations that provide local- and statelevel emergency responders with an understanding of the duties, responsibilities, and capabilities of a Safety Officer on an All-Hazards IMT.

S-430/ EL0958 Blended

Operations Section Chief

Tues, Jan 30, 0800 to Fri, Feb 2, 1700

Designed for the operations section chief in the incident command system, this interactive course involves exercises designed to facilitate group and classroom discussion to explain the four elements of planning critical to the OSC: information gathering, strategy meetings, preparation of the Incident Action Plan (ICS 215), and the OSC role in demobilization.



S-440/EL0962 Blended

Planning Section Chief

Tues, Jan 30, 0800 to Fri, Feb 2, 1700

The course is designed to meet a portion of the training needs of the planning section chief in the incident command system. Topics include information gathering, strategies, meetings and briefings, incident action plan (IAP), interactions, forms, documents, supplies, demobilization, and an optional technology section. In the final exercise, students observe a simulated planning meeting and use the information derived to find errors in an IAP. Students must pass the unit tests and the final exercise to successfully complete the

Wednesday, January 31, 2024

Join fellow students and instructors for a free Buffet dinner in the Great Lakes Ballroom. Social hour is at 5:00 pm followed by dinner at 6:00 pm and presentation at 7:00 pm. Commander Travis Thul of the U.S. Coast Guard will speak to how ICS is implemented from the USCG level and his experiences from some of the major incidents he has been involved with. CDR Travis Thul is the Senior Reserve Officer for U.S. Coast Guard Sector Sault Sainte Marie. In this capacity, he serves as a member of the sector's Command Cadre and oversees 37 reserve billets over an area of responsibility spanning Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Michigan's international and interstate waterways. CDR Thul's Incident Command System experience spans natural disasters, manmade events, humanitarian operations, and National Special Security Events. This includes serving as the Logistics Section Chief during Operation Vigilant Sentry, where he oversaw coordination of medical and humanitarian supplies in support of Haitian surge operations; as the maritime Deputy Incident Commander for the 2020 Democratic National Convention, where he planned and coordinated dozens of intragovernmental partners securing a presidential nomination convention; as Deputy Planning Section Chief during Operation Allies Welcome, where he helped lead the resettlement of 12,000 Afghan refugees; and as the Deputy Logistics Section Chief during the Hurricane Maria response, where he oversaw reestablishment of power, water, and sewer services on the island of Puerto Rico. CDR Thul is a Type 3 qualified Incident Commander, holds a Doctor in Engineering Management, is a licensed Professional Engineer, and served as a White House Fellow from 2020 - 2021.
